Our 7 Best Tips for a Better Organic Vegetable Garden this Fall!

Whether you're gardening in the ground or planting up veggies in colorful pottery, you CAN grow your own groceries. Follow along for our expert tips on premium soils, fertilizers, and tools for successful fall planting:

- **I. Soil refresh.** In each vegetable growing season, soil nutrients need to be replenished and soil tilth restored. For this job we recommend Sloat Loam Builder blended 50/50 with native soil, or one bag for every 25 square feet. Be sure to work the soil to at least a 1-foot depth if you're planting root crops.
- **2. Start your plants right.** Incorporate E.B. Stone Organics Sure Start when planting to give them a boost. It's blended with humic acid and beneficial soil microbes to help plant roots utilize available nutrients. Gentle, organic, and easy to use.
- **3.** Choose quality soil. When growing in containers or raised beds, use Sloat Organic Potting Soil. During growth, feed plants every 4 weeks with Maxsea All Purpose if planting in containers or E.B. Stone Organics Tomato & Vegetable Food if planting in the ground.



- **4. Water.** Be sure to keep young plants hydrated. Water maturing plants regularly to keep them growing. Bitterness develops in greens that are not watered enough.
- **5.Always add flowers.** Enhance the appearance and performance of your vegetable garden by interplanting fall annuals like Alyssum, Pansies and Violas. Alyssum does double duty by attracting syrphid or hover flies. These beneficial insects are always on the lookout for aphids (a common lettuce / Brassica crop pest) and will lay eggs that hatch into voracious pest eaters!
- **6. Keep critters away.** Protect young plants with a lightweight row cover we carry the brand *Haxnicks*, available as micro-mesh sheets or seed tunnels. Some critters (caterpillars, birds, aphids, slugs, etc.) are notorious for eating seedlings.
- 7. Implement Water Wise tools for a healthy and beautiful garden. Use soaker hoses to let water seep in, and apply a 1''-3'' layer of mulch over soaker hoses and exposed soil in planting beds, containers, and shrub borders. Mulch reduces moisture loss from soil, moderates soil temperatures to keep roots cool, and controls weeds that compete for water.


Vegetable Planting Timeline

September Garden Checklist "Fall is about the changing of the seasons and giving your garden, patio, roof deck, or front door a fresh look. It's a chance to switch out summer annuals with fall annual color. -- Gerry, Manager, Sloat Blvd SF location **Plant** ☐ Welcome fall in containers and garden beds. Plant Pansies, Violas, Mums, ornamental kale and cabbage, Stock, Iceland Poppies, and Cyclamen for pops Grow your own Groceries this fall: Plant kale, collard, spinach, arugula, peas, and lettuces. ☐ Fall is a great time to plant and plan for landscaping projects. Stop in and talk to our expert staff about flower and vegetable beds, container design, and adding focal points to your space. Plant cover crops like fava beans and clovers to fix nitrogen in the soil and improve soil structure. ☐ Adopt a houseplant this month to relieve stress and elevate the mood ☐ Plant garlic and shallots to harvest next summer. Prune/Maintain ☐ Mulch to inhibit weeds and conserve moisture. ☐ Need help diagnosing a problem? Enclose bugs or diseased plant samples in a sealed plastic bag and bring them in for help with a diagnosis. **Fertilize** Fertilize perennials with E.B. Stone Organics Ultra Bloom Fertilizer (0-10-10) to stimulate bud formation for winter/spring bloom and develop a hardier root structure. Containers: summer annuals, and cool season annuals will enjoy monthly feeding at this time of year; use Maxsea All-Purpose fertilizer.

Back to Basics: Fall is the right time for Planting

Perennials, trees, vines, and shrubs are best planted (or replaced) in fall when the soil is still warm from the summer sun. Take advantage of fall weather to add new plants to your space.


WaterWise Choices: Fall Planting

Go WaterWise this season by choosing California natives. They are adapted to our dry summer climate. Native plants need time to get established, but once they do, many need minimal irrigation beyond rainfall. Some staff favorites: Achillea, Erigeron, and Ceanothus. Scattering California Wildflower seeds is another wonderful WaterWise option. 
- Mix Soil Moist into the container's potting mixture. This will help reduce how often you'll need to water.
- Water less frequently but more thoroughly. Plants will thrive with deep waterings, allowing some water to drain through. Always water the whole surface area and drain saucers if they fill up. The top first inch of soil should dry out between waterings.
- Use a top dressing such as moss, mulch, or gravel to help retain moisture.

- **5.** Herbs and fruiting shrubs can be planted in containers for a convenient kitchen garden.







Plant

- ☐ Fall is for planting! Get shrubs, perennials and trees into the ground this month. Also, grow your own groceries by planting herbs and greens!
- ☐ Plant Cyclamen and Primrose in October or early November. It's also a great time to plant ground covers and sweet peas. Violas and Pansies will create mass color in containers and flowerbeds to cover dormant spring bulbs.
- ☐ For a hardy alternative, consider planting ornamental grasses. Grasses require little upkeep and can create a beautiful screening effect against a house or fence. ☐ It's time to plant Daffodils for spring. Also, Amaryllis and paper white Narcis-
- ☐ This is the perfect time to select and plant California native plants.

Prune/Maintain


- ☐ Prepare planting beds for winter. Clear weeds and rocks, then amend soil with Sloat Loam Builder for vegetables and Sloat Forest Mulch Plus for perennials and shrubs.
- ☐ Divide the roots and rhizomes of perennials like Agapanthus, Achillea, and Iris.
- ☐ Lightly prune Japanese Maples while still in leaf. Select and plant maples (now is the time to see fall color).
- ☐ Treat Hydrangeas with Espoma Organic Soil Acidifier or E.B. Stone Naturals
 True Blue in order to keep blue Hydrangeas blue. Treat with Agricultural Lime to
 turn Hydrangeas pink.
- ☐ It's time to fill your bird feeders for winter. Try a suet feeder!

Fertilize

Feed citrus with Maxsea Acid Formula. Supplement with EB Stone F.S.T to keep them green all winter.
